– DECISION MAKING –

As the lead agency on poverty and the designated Community Action Agency for Talbot County, Neighborhood Service Center, Inc. "NSC" understands the health and well-being of low-income residents of Talbot. In fact, NSC served approximately sixty-four percent of the 9.6% or 3,612 of Talbot Residents living in Poverty in 2021.

Since 1969, NSC has consistently served residents of Talbot County, even though, the request for services has increased greatly in every area. Last year alone, NSC served throughout the 17 towns/districts in Talbot County (from the most populated (centrally located) areas of Talbot to the least populated/ remote areas.

The pandemic, in addition to the current economic conditions have contributed to new first-time households seeking assistance, which is why we are so very appreciative of our strong partner support from Talbot County Government and the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development for their guidance and backing in securing the Emergency Rental Assistance Program to assist households experiencing crisis as a result of COVID-19.

As apart of our efforts to eliminate poverty, NSC added its Career Pathways Program for Youth ages, 16 - 24 that are out of school and work so that they can find educational and employment opportunities. In addition, NSC has enhanced its Mobile Food Program, which delivers to seniors, the disabled, those living in remote areas of Talbot without transportation, and also to those affected by COVID-19.

Other highlights:

- NSC was approved for a \$200,000 Maryland Capital Grant to rehabilitate NSC's "Caldwell Project, located at 34 S. West Street. We are especially appreciative of Dock Street Foundation's support in securing the purchase of the property;
- NSC received 38 laptops from the Federal Surplus Program. These laptops were used to enhance our youth program, provide technology for our board members and staff members; as well as assist individuals without access to laptops to apply for jobs and write resumes;
- NSC completed its renovation project of its 6 South Street Property and filled all of its vacancies. This project was made possible through Talbot County Government and the DHCD's Community Development Block Grant;
- NSC actively participated in the COVID-19 Task Force in Talbot County: and
- Updated our Strategic Plan!

As we move towards 2022, NSC has some very exiting projects in-store to include Resources workshops, narrowing the digital divide in computer and internet access for low-income families; updating our Community Needs Assessment and preparing to explore the feasibility of building our new center, "The Self-Sufficiency Center".






Employment Status






Sources of Household Income



Household Level Characteristics






Households Received Child Support

Housing by Household




At NSC, we encourage our customers to reduce housing costs to at or below 30% .of their total household income.
